SPIRIT Protocol



Experiencing Sexual Assault or Sexual Harassment can prompt questions of a spiritual, philosophical and religious nature.

- Why did this happen to me?
- Where was God when I was raped?
- Am I being punished for something I did?
- Am I a bad person? Did I bring this on myself?
- Will I ever feel better? What will life be like?
- Am I supposed to forgive my attacker?
- I am so angry at God, is that OK?

Chaplains help Soldiers explore these critical questions enabling holistic and integrated healing from the experiences of sexual assault and other forms of trauma.



Chaplains provide 100% Confidential Communications, if such communication is made either as a formal act of religion or as a matter of conscience.

This confidentiality builds a safe space for people who have experienced sexual assault to seek help, and find support and hope. Regardless of a person's religious (or non-religious) background, Army Chaplains serve all Soldiers. Soldiers can contact any Chaplain for spiritual support, and referrals to additional services if desired.



“Chaplains respect confidentiality in their provision of pastoral care and counseling. Chaplains respect, honor, and **guard the trust of those they serve** in ministry as officers in the Army Profession, so that an individual's trust and personal privacy are not violated.” AR 165-1, 16-1



What you can expect from a Chaplain if you seek support for an experience of Sexual Assault or Sexual Harassment:

S Supportive Environment

P Pacing Conversation. The Soldier sets the pace for sharing in counseling.

I Information Sharing. The Chaplain can provide both military and community resources if desired.

R Restore to Life. Chaplain supports in the Soldier's healing journey.

I Integrating the Experience. Chaplains support the Soldier through seeking clarity and acceptance.

T Think Theologically. Chaplains help the Soldier explore larger questions prompted by their experience.
