Tips for a Great Small Group Experience

Pre-Sets (Learning Environment Setting)

- 1. Use of Curriculum
- 2. Lead Great Discussions
- 3. Ask Great Questions
- 4. Listen
- 5. Study the material
- 6. Pray/Thinking together

Considerations:

- -Virtual and In-Person Small Groups: As restrictions on gatherings imposed by the COVID-19 crisis begin to ease, Chapel and Unit ministry is likely to be found in a both/and reality (a hybrid of virtual and in-person ministry).
- -Sustainability: Sustain an enhanced digital presence, while at the same time resume normal patterns of gathering.
- -**Support:** Time to innovate and create teams to support the challenges and opportunities of this new normal.



Clarify the Role/Purpose of Small Groups

- ✓ Is your chapel a community with groups, of groups or one that is groups?
- ✓ Does the small group organize around content, experiences (affinity), or mission (service)?
- ✓ How will the small group assimilate new people into the community?





Use Curriculum

How to Use Curriculum Well

- ✓ Little or no homework
- ✓ Promotes discussion and encourages participation Engagement of participants.
- ✓ Pray and read through the material Consider your participants, discussion, and content.
- ✓ Rewrite and adapt questions Contextualize to the group's needs.
- ✓ Don't feel forced to complete Celebrate the process.





Lead Great Discussions

Keys to Leading a Great Discussion

- ✓ Know the point Have fun, but remember the big idea.
- ✓ Start with an icebreaker Start shallow, then go deep.
- ✓ Create a safe environment Create a place where people can share without being judged; non-competitive; and say what you believe.
- ✓ Stay on course, but be flexible "rabbit trails,"
 jokes, and "randomness" are okay.
- ✓Involve everyone in the discussion What do you think? What would you add?
- ✓ Use space well Comfortable, without distraction, allow for eye contact.





Ask Great Questions

How do you ask great questions?

- √Study the discussion guide
- ✓ Ask open-ended questions Feel, think, respond
- ✓ Understand What? So What? Now what?
- ✓ Avoid fishing for right answer
- ✓ Don't answer your own question Don't be afraid of silence.
- ✓ You cannot judge someone's answer Help people process the response and not judge.





Listen

How do you listen actively?

- ✓ Make eye contact
- ✓ Resist interruption, story-topping, joke making, or finish another's sentence
- ✓ Ask Follow-up questions "Share more of that . . . "
- ✓ Restate what was shared Bring it inside and bring it outside (seek to understand).
- ✓ Encourage everyone to stay engaged "Hey, this is really important, I want to make sure that everyone hears this . . ."
- ✓ Thank people for contribution, vulnerability, and depth Help create safety and value in sharing.





Study the Bible

Study principles:

- ✓ God's Word is the final word
- **✓** Context of the verse is key
- ✓ Know the author and intended audience What did the original audience need to hear, know, or do?
- ✓Interpret the unclear with the clear Exegesis, no eisegesis.
- ✓ Submit to the teaching Explain, Illustrate, and Apply.





Pray Together

Community praying together

- **✓** Sentence prayers
- ✓ Pray in smaller groups
- √Write prayer requests down
- ✓ Praises only
- ✓ Pray through Scripture



A systematic approach that ties the congregations' religious education program to the pastoral message as expressed by the chaplain during the service, allowing the knowledge and experience gained in that encounter to be built upon throughout the week, and increase the likelihood of it being lived in the work place and home.

This allows for the life to flow from the scripture/sermon, through the congregation, and into the force, and perhaps result in the growth of the congregation and an increase in the overall spiritual resilience of Soldiers and Family members.

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THRIVE ELEMENTS



GATHER – small group communities (8-10 people) from each of the Chapel congregations.



GROW – building community by sharing scripture, fellowship/hospitality, experiences, and serving together.



GO – faith into action and application of Truth into daily life. Sent to serve others.

Each group led by a facilitator. Gatherings held when and where the participants decide (first, second, and third places).

Guiding Values

Desired Outcome

1. We **BLESS** people, both inside and outside the chapel Communities.

2. We **EAT** together, sharing meals with believers and nonbelievers alike.

- 3. We **LISTEN** to the guidance and direction of the God through Scripture as we engage with those around us.
- 4. We intimately **LEARN** Christ as our leader and model for making disciples.
 - 5. We see ourselves as **SENT** by God to everywhere life takes us.

RELATIONAL

-Assimilate newcomers into the chapel fellowships

-Create larger, welcoming chapel Community for the Garrison community.

RELIGIOUS EDUCATION AND SPIRITUAL FORMATION

-For participants to grow in their faith through inductive dialogical Bible Study and apply deeper truths of Scripture to daily living.

SPIRITUAL RESILIENCE and SERVICE TO OTHERS

-Increased interaction within and between chapel Communities through living and sharing faith experiences.

-Increased extension of service from chapel Communities to the broader Army Community.

ELEMENTS

Virtual, In-person, or Hybrid Groups (up to 10 people)



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THRIVE COMMUNITY BUILDING Environments

First Places - Homes

Second Places – Work places

Third Places – Informal Gathering Spaces (neutral ground where individuals are free to come and go as they please, where rank and status in the workplace or society at large are of no importance.)

Gatherings in a home can host up to 10 people (e.g., 5 couples, 10 singles, 3 families of 3 and a single, etc.) or 2 Families regardless of size (e.g., 2 Families of 10 are fine).

How to become part of a Thrive Group:

- Participate in the initial Thrive Group orientation.
- 2. Participate in the Foundations Class.
- 3. Join a Thrive Group or start one.
- **4. Decide** on the **frequency** of meeting together (once a week, twice a month).
- **5. Decide where** to meet (home, work, informal gathering space).
- **6. Decide what** to gather around -- content, experiences, and/or mission.
- 7. Coordinate with DRE and Chapel pastors.
