ADVENT

The word 'Advent' is from the Latin 'Adventus,' which means 'coming.' Advent is the beginning of a new liturgical year (in the Western churches), and encompasses the span of time from the fourth Sunday before Christmas, until the Nativity of Our Lord is celebrated. The first Sunday of Advent will always fall somewhere between November 27th at the earliest and December 3rd at the latest. The liturgical color for this season is purple (Usually a deep purple as opposed to the lighter, red-violet shade of purple associated with Lent).

Like Lent, Advent is a preparatory season. It has significance because it is a season of looking forward and waiting for something greater; both for the annual celebration of the event of Christ's birth, and for the time when Christ will come again.

So today, on this third Sunday of Advent, we take a little extra time to prepare ourselves for the coming of Christ at His birth and at the end of time when Christ will come again.



Hope, Love, Joy, Peace Room 27

These four words are often used for the candles on an Advent wreath. As we light a new candle each week, we are reminded that it is a time of preparation.

Hope – Romans 15:12-13 Reminds us Jesus is coming

Faith – Luke 3:4-6 Reminds us to prepare the way of the Lord

Joy – Luke 2:10 Reminds us of the joy at the coming birth of Jesus

Peace – Luke 2:14 Reminds us of God's glory and promise of peace

Which of these do you feel called by God to share with others in their lives right now? Light a candle and say a prayer that you will recognize the opportunity to bring hope, love, joy and peace to those you encounter this holiday season.



Spell out your favorite name for Jesus using the letter tiles and add it to our crosswords.




Shepherd


